- B. Diversity and Inclusion

Gorham reported that they met with Lakota Hobia and discussed the process for updating text on the Kalamazoo Public Library Site. This month, tribal members will collect text. In the coming months, meetings will be set up to work on updating text. Text should be finalized in November or December and text should be launched in early 2023.

Edison spoke about a meeting with the Society for History and Racial Equity (SHARE). Members from SHARE discussed current projects. Gorham also talked about some of the SHARE projects, like a potential historic marker project. Gorham also indicated that the HPC would like to be involved and help SHARE moving forward.

Edison then spoke about some research conducted by Dr. Powell-Wilson about the protests that happened at the Van Avery drug store in the 1960s and about Albert White, a local contractor. Powell-Wilson went on to say that the Van Avery drug store is still standing, and that the building is currently occupied by the Ecumenical Senior Center. Powell-Wilson then suggested honoring both the Van Avery protest and Albert White with a Historic Preservation award of merit in 2023. Edison and Powell-Wilson both discussed the Douglass center. Edison also brought up other areas of diversity, like Native American history and LGTQ+ history. Gorham thought that the Douglass center may be the most viable option for historic recognition. Powell-Wilson said that next steps should include having a discussion to decide what property should be focused on.

B. Inventory and Surveys – Report at meeting (Pena)

Pena indicated that he updated the text for the Inventory Kalamazoo page on the Imagine Kalamazoo page, worked on promotional materials with the communications team and updated the search interface for the Survey123 App.

C. Grave Issues – Report at Meeting (Hibbard and Pena)

Hibbard reported that Pena, Hibbard and Walker visited Mountain home cemetery in preparation of a cleaning date. It was decided at the meeting that the first cemetery cleaning will take place on August 28th at 9AM.

Tentatively, the next cleaning dates were established as the 10th and 17th of September.

F. Sustainability

Pena said that a resident in Vine was willing to have a window repair workshop held at his home. Powell-Wilson also spoke about using one of their properties for a window workshop. A date is to be determined. Edison stated they were interested in joining the OHOW subcommittee.

Pena stated that he would receive comments for the document prior to the nomination going to the State Historic Preservation Review Board. White moved to approve the recommend the nomination to the State Historic Review Board. Powell-Wilson seconded. The motion carried unanimously.
