- **I. Call to order:** The meeting was called to order at 6:08
- II. Roll call and approval of absences:

  - A. Approval of Agenda: Peña asked to add an update of the City Hall Local Historic district to new business. White moved to approve the agenda as amended, Edison seconded the motion.

#### **III.** Introduction of Guests:

#### A. Jae Slaby – Neighborhood Activator, City of Kalamazoo

Slaby made introductions and spoke about a Ransom Street historic pillar program. The pillar program would recognize prominent citizens and business from the northside. Slaby estimated that this work would take place in conjunction with northside residents and the NACD. Slaby wondered if the HPC would be willing to help with research, drafting or funding. Powell-Wilson said that she was unsure about HPC being the only sponsor, Slaby said that the NACD would take the lead on the project. Gorham wondered if Slaby spoke with TRHT or SHARE. Slaby said they had not yet but would be willing to reach out. White asked if the stories or people for the pillars had been selected, Slaby said not yet. Slaby then spoke about the neighborhood plans for the Stuart neighborhood and the Parkview Hills neighborhood.

Peña reported no change in the financial report.

- B. Diversity and Inclusion
  - 1. Kalamazoo Reservation Public Education Report at meeting (Gorham)

Gorham stated that she has been meeting monthly with Lakota Hobia, Tiger Martin and Keith Howard to migrate and shape text. Gorham looked for historic maps of the Kalamazoo river within the Kalamazoo Valley Museum.

c. Inventory and Surveys – Report at meeting (Pena)

Vail spoke about analyzing the Historic Survey data. Vail said the data can be kept in Survey123/ESRI, and that work can be completed within ESRI. Peña then spoke about beginning analysis work on 1,000 or 2,000 properties at a time so data can be shared with SHPO. To complete this analysis work, Peña speculated that consultants will need to be hired. White asked if a budget is already set aside for data analysis, Peña said that the budgeting will need to be figured out.

D. Grave Issues – Report at meeting (Hibbard and Pena)

Peña said that while the water is turned off at the cemetery, there can still be research and procurement activities during the winter months.

F. Grantmaking – Report at meeting, proposed website text attached

White presented the written report. Powell-Wilson asked about grant scoring and White explained the Scoring criteria that were developed.

Peña read a report.

G. OHOW – Report at meeting

Powell-Wilson explained that Sharon Ferraro was unable to meet, so a future meeting is being coordinated to develop a workshop for 2023. Peña spoke about running some smaller workshops with reglazing windows in the Sexton's lodge.

#### VI. Old/New Business

#### A. Event Proposal – Historic Preservation Month 2023

Peña presented the memo. Edison asked if the proposed event would take place at the beginning of Preservation month. Peña said that a firm schedule has not been set yet.

#### B. 2023 Budget Review and Approval

Vail asked why there were duplicate professional and contractual services. Peña was unsure, but said he would ask. White asked if the budget was requested, Peña thought that the budget increase was decided last year.

Powell-Wilson moved to approve the budget, Vail seconded the motion. The motion passed by unanimous roll call vote.

#### C. City Hall Local Historic District Update

Peña reported that he presented the study report to the Planning Commission on November 3<sup>rd</sup>.

#### VII. Approval of meeting notes:
